Rolbiecki, popular teacher/coach, dies

Elected to Viking Hall of Fame in 2017; was mainstay here for 36 years

Jim Rolbiecki, one of the most recognizable figures in Minneota for many years, died peacefully at his home surrounded by family Sunday morning after a seven-month battle with cancer.

Rolbiecki remained strong and positive during his illness, often being seen attending local events.

"Jim Rolbeicki was a great man who was a positive influence on both the students and

the athletes of Minneota High School," said head football and boys' basketball coach Chad Johnston. "Jim was the AD at the time I was hired to be a teacher in Minneota. He was one of the first people from the school that I met. He hired me to be an assistant football coach, a Junior High girls basketball coach, and an assistant baseball coach. He will always be a positive influence in my life.'

Rolbiecki was a teacher and coach for 36 years at Minneota High School. He was inducted into the Minneota Hall of his father at the Hall of Fame Fame in 2017, the same year his daughter, Jami (Rolbiecki) Bossuyt was inducted. Jim insisted on having the inscription on his Hall of Fame plaque read: "It was for the kids."

Jim explained the inscription at the ceremony by telling that he had once asked the late Dale Yost why he taught and coached.

"Dale told me it's for the kids and that always stuck with me," Rolbiecki said.

Minneota mayor John Rolbiecki, Jim's son, introduced ceremony.

Rolbiecki started the Minneota girls' softball program in 1983 and remained head coach until 2015.

"He was a great coach and teacher of the game," said Renee Wyffels, who played for Rolbiecki from 1993-96 and was the catcher for three years when his daughter, Jami, was the pitcher. "He really stressed the basic fundamentals of the game. He is one of the people who influenced me to go on and play college softball at

Southwest Minnesota State University.'

Heidi Louwagie was his assistant coach from 1991-96 years before switching to coaching golf. In 2013, she returned to coach with Rolbiecki again until he resigned in 2015 and she took over the program as head coach.

"Jim welcomed me into the Viking family as a friend and mentor when I landed in Minneota in 1990," Louwagie said.

Another Boxelder Bug Days is complete and this one was another huge success.

"With the people we have (on the committee), this has gotten to the point where it almost runs itself now," said Bug Days chairman Scott Josephson.

The three-day event started off with a touching and somber moment when the Bug Days committee collaborated with the Minneota Football Boosters, Minneota Wrestling Boosters and Minneota Mudhens amateur baseball team to pay tribute to Ross Eischens following the Vikings' 55-12 rout of Yellow Medicine East in a Little Sioux Conference football game at K.P. Kompelien Field. The personable Eischens was a longtime public address announcer for each of those sports, as well as for the Bug Days queen coronation. He died after a brief illness in July at age 42. An audio tape was played of Eischens' voice announcing at a football game. Several fans could be seen wiping tears from their eyes. That was followed by an impressive firework show.


"I didn't cry but I was shocked that I won," said Kayla, who was sponsored by Darlene's Cafe. "I remember we were all lined up below the main stage."

There were 16 candidates for Boxelder Bug Days queen that year. They were all interviewed in the conference room on the north end of the former Minneota Manor.

As you walk downstairs in tion right in front of you at first glance is because they are displayed in an artistic design on an entire wall in his basement.





Thank you

I've always been able to speak in front of a crowd without getting nervous, but I always fidget and am unsure what to say when receiving an award or even a compliment. My parents always encouraged me to show more appreciation, but my problem has always been that someone likely deserves it more and that makes me uncomfortable.

It's not that I am trying to be humble. I honestly have always thought there is someone out there that can what I do better, whether it's writing, speaking, singing or dancing.

My daughter, who inherited my smart-alec sense of humor, had her usual wry response when I told her the news. "Why, did everyone else already take their turn?"

So, when I was asked to be the Grand Marshal for this year's Boxelder Bug Days parade, I immediately felt that someone living in Minneota, or a Minneota native, has done more for the community and deserves the honor more. Feeling it would be wrong to say "no", I accepted.

I've rubbed some people in town the wrong way over the 10 years that I've written for the Mascot, some of it my fault and some not. I've always tried to apologize to people even when I felt I should have been the recipient of the apology because it almost always seemed to quell the disagreement. Not always ... but almost.

I don't display any of the trophies or awards at my home or at the Mascot office that I have received over the years, except for my sports trophies because I truly earned those. In fact, I didn't even submit any articles or photos to the Minnesota Newspaper Contest last year, although we will this year when I was convinced the awards are more of a reflection of the newspaper than the individual.

I was honored to be chosen by the Boxelder Bug Days committee to be in the parade and the reason Scott Josephson gave me truly touched my heart and brought tears to my eyes. I can't thank them enough for asking me.

I grew up in Tracy and I used to watch the Box Car Days parade every year while collecting candy thrown out to the kids. The grand marshal was always someone prominent in town, or used to live in town. I will always remember longtime physician Dr. Workman leading the parade on horseback several times in his military uniform. When "Doc" passed away many years ago, he was again posthumously chosen as the parade's grand marshal. This time, though, his boots were placed backwards in the stirrups and someone led the riderless horse through the parade. It was a somber moment for those that knew him.

I didn't get to ride a horse through this year's parade, but I did get to ride in something even cooler. I was seated in style in the back of Lynn and Barb Okrina's 1956 synergy-green metallic Chevy pickup. I was proud to ride in such a classic vehicle, rather than my beat-up Chevy Blazer with over 300,000 miles on it.

I was trying to come up with something to throw to the kids besides candy because I was afraid there would be a repeat of a parade that I attended last summer in Delano when a little girl standing a few feet away from me was hit in the forehead by a sucker and screamed as blood trickled down her face. I did end up throwing candy and I don't think I maimed anyone. And even though I came prepared for a few tomatoes or jeers thrown my way, I thoroughly enjoyed myself and can say I am proud to be associated with such a wonderful community. Thank you to the Okrinas for allowing me to ride in style. And thank you to the Boxelder Bug Days committee for choosing me to be your grand marshal, even if it might have been because everyone had already taken their turn.

Sophomore churns for 185 yards, 3 TDs in 55-12 win over YME

Sophomore running back Ryan Meagher ran for 185 yards in only 10 carries and scored three touchdown as Minneota steamrolled Yellow Medicine East 55-12 in a Little Sioux Conference game Friday night at K.P, Kompelien Field.

The Vikings (2-0) scored in every quarter and amassed 25 first downs and 523 total yards in handing the Sting (1-1) their first loss.

Minneota scored on its opening possession, an eight-play, 52-yard drive that was capped by Meagher's three-yard TD run on a sweep around left end.

On YME's ensuing possession, Jack Lacek intercepted Jacob Peterson pass near the sideline and scampered 40 yards for a score to make it 14-0 after one quarter.

The Vikings made it 21-0 on their first possession of the

Board kicks off budget talks for 2023

The Lyon County Board of Commissioners on Monday set a preliminary levy increase of 4.305 percent for 2023.

The board has until Sept. 30 to certify a preliminary levy. It can lower the levy before the final budget is set in December but cannot raise it.

"The proposal is looking pretty good, considering inflation issues that we have to deal with," said Lyon County Administrator Loren Stomberg. "It's kind of hard to predict where our costs are going to be for equipment. We assume that it's going to go up ... our fuel costs are starting to come down a little bit, but it's a little more challenging this year with the fuel and equipment prices and employee turnover to really focus on what the numbers are."

Lyon County Board of Commissioners Chair Steve Ritter asked about a few of the bud-

get items that have a significant projected increase in cost for 2023:

• Auditor/Treasurer — up 6.7% from the 2022 budget.

"That is based on where we think the salaries are going to come in," Stomberg said. "Most of that is salary-based. I do know with all the changes, we might be doing some reorganization there; we might be able to shave some of that down, I'm not sure."

• Jail — up 14.4 percent.

"The big factor in that is the increase in inmate health," Stomberg said.

• Probation - up 28.5 percent

"That's always a moving target," said Stomberg. "That's based on what we think the State is going to reimburse us and what they're going to bill us for."

"That is a major priority, trying to figure out the funding formula for all three of the probation systems," added commissioner Rick Anderson. • Emergency Service — up 73.9 percent

"We had budgeted for a full-time position ... we have a candidate that looks pretty interesting and are interviewing another one next week," Stomberg said. "These would be part-time positions."

Stomberg said there are some things working in the county's favor, such as its property and casualty workman's comp insurance, which has a net result of about a \$7,000 increase, and the county's interest rate on investments.

"I think this is a good start to come in with a pretty realistic preliminary budget when you listen to what some of these other places are going to be doing," Anderson said.

In other board news from Tuesday ...

• The board approved two resolutions granting requests for property tax relief reim-

bursement from damaging storms on May 11-12 and May 29-30. The board declared Lyon County a local disaster area for each of those incidents. In order to make the final application to the Executive Council at the State of Minnesota, the board must pass a resolution requesting reimbursement of property tax relief. Once the application for state aid is approved, the County can begin the process of calculating actual Homestead Disaster Credits, which are granted on tax statements for the year following

the date of the disaster. • The board set its annual ditch assessment hearings for Tuesday, Oct. 4, at 1:30 p.m. for County Ditches and 2 p.m. for Joint/Judicial Ditches.

• During a conference call with Lincoln County, the boards agreed on a final hearing date of Thursday, Oct. 20, at 9 a.m. for JD 31 Branch 24 L & L.






